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## Backgrounds of American Literary Thought

### American Poems ( 1625-1892

Schwartz speculates that Johnson - who revered hard facts, a wide cultural base, and common sense - would have exhibited scant patience with the heavily academic approaches currently favored in the study of literature. He considers it probable that the combatants in the early struggles of the culture wars are losing energy and that, in the wake of Alvin Kernan's declaration of the death of literature, new battlegrounds are developing. Ironically admiring the orchestration and staging of battles old and new - "superb" he calls them - he characterizes the entire culture war as a "battle between straw men, carefully constructed by the combatants to sustain a pattern of polarization that could be exploited to provide continuing professional advancement."

## **MODERN AND CONTEMPORARY AMERICAN LITERATURE**

When Thomas Gossett's *Race: The History of an Idea in America* appeared in 1963, it explored the impact of race theory on American letters in a way that anticipated the investigation of race and culture being conducted today. Bold, rigorous, and broad in scope, Gossett's book quickly established itself as a critical resource to younger scholars seeking a candid, theoretically sophisticated treatment of race in American cultural history. The Pochmann-Allen anthology *Masters of American Literature* was from its first publication in the late 1940's until recently a widely-used textbook in its field. The long historical essays giving the backgrounds to American literature from the seventeenth to the twentieth century and the extensive author-essays preceding the works made the Pochmann-Allen volumes a reference work in colleges and universities when it was not adopted as a text. Furthermore, the authors' knowledge and judgment in concentrating on the "masters" from Cotton Mather to Stephen Crane, as is here done, were amply demonstrated: in spite of great scholarly and critical activity since the volumes were published, new discoveries have not essentially affected reputations and values during the past two decades, and the authors' essays on the writers discussed remain authoritative. The author-essays are here brought together, preceded by the historical introductions (now combined into one), and are made available once again in this handbook form. In its new, brief form the book thus affords a reliable, comprehensive, and richly detailed guide to American literature.

This specially commissioned volume of essays offers a refreshing and unusual perspective on classic novels from the American literary canon. Accessible to students, scholars and the interested reader, this engaging collection explores familiar novels through unfamiliar lenses and, in so doing, sheds light on surprising and previously overlooked aspects of each text. Reading America presents a new approach to American literature by showcasing a cross-section of recent research into previously un-tapped areas of interest. Each chapter attempts to re-read classic American texts using new or unorthodox theoretical frameworks, including such diverse topics as an Emersonian reading of Don DeLillo, decoding Thomas Pynchon with eco-criticism and understanding Paul Auster's New York Trilogy by exploring the graphic novel version of "City of Glass". Other authors explored in this way include Henry James, Truman Capote, Ralph Ellison, Toni Morrison, Joyce Carol Oates and F. Scott Fitzgerald. This type of approach widens the reader's knowledge of each well-known text and encourages new critical evaluations of contemporary American literature. The collection moves through six

large topic areas, from Naturalism and an idea of the “Great American Novel” at the end of the nineteenth century, through politics, sexuality, language and nature, to a contemporary engagement with postmodernism. Each essay deals with its own particular subject and author, but the full impact of each on the notion of the “American novel” as a phenomenon can only be understood when read in conjunction with the others. Of interest to both undergraduate and postgraduate students, Reading America would be a valuable asset to any American Studies or American Literature degree course, and a useful companion to American History or Politics courses. The volume will also attract strong interest from established academics, especially those researching the fields of literature, critical theory, cultural history and politics.
